The Rochester Museum of Fine Arts (RMFA) is an all-volunteer, community art initiative dedicated to the accessibility of contemporary works made by

regionally, nationally, and internationally recognized artists. Founded in 2011, the RMFA works to enrich people's lives through the presentation of fine art. The permanent collection and other rotating exhibitions are prominently displayed in

the halls and Suite 135 of the James W. Foley Memorial Community Center and Rochester Public Library.

The permanent collection includes more than 200 multidisciplinary works that represent a constantly evolving range of visual expression, including painting, sculpture, printmaking, drawing, photography, and film. In addition, the museum features rotating temporary exhibits displayed in the Mayor Harvey E. Bernier Room and Andrew Carnegie Gallery, which showcase the work of both emerging and established artists. The Pixel Room provides a platform for extraordinary and thought-provoking digital works, presented on a 4K UHD LED display.



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I use my art to evoke the land around me, and explore questions around queer identity. My experience as a trail builder has had a significant influence on my work. Recently I made a series of ink drawings from a lichen brush I originally designed for a class at RISD CE. I often focus on portraying the minutiae of specific moments in nature with fiber and/or oil paints, like the young lime green leaves of a beech tree glowing in the sun. I do this to elevate what is often overlooked in our disconnected society. These works are a lyrical catalog of both grief and joy in time spent being present on the land.

My queerness as a natural phenomenon, despite attempts to erase that, is a concept that I am currently exploring with oil paintings. I use bold, almost neon, color and shape to speak to the target I have felt on my back in the outdoor industry, but also to show the unspeakable beauty and exuberance of queerness. Often, I situate that queerness in green space to emphasize its natural origins. I choose palettes and color intensity that make it impossible for people to look away from these paintings.




